

Installing the SIM Card

Your SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.



Battery Use

Battery performance depends on many factors, including your wireless carrier's network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; items attached to your phone's accessory connector; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Caution: To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximize your battery's performance:

- Always use Motorola OriginalTM batteries and battery chargers. The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.
- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for a long time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging.
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or

an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



The rechargeable batteries that power this phone must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery type. Contact your local recycling center for proper disposal methods.


Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Installing the Battery

Note: If necessary, remove the battery from its protective clear plastic case.



Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories. We recommend that you store batteries in their protective cases when not in use.



Charging the Battery

3

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Action

1 Plug the travel charger into the bottom of your phone.





- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates Charge Complete, remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On



Action

1 Press and hold for 2 seconds to turn on the phone.



2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press **OK** (<a>) to unlock the SIM card.


Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.

3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press **OK** ((-)) to unlock the phone.


Adjusting Volume

Press up or down on volume keys to:

- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible



Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press $\stackrel{\cdot}{\smile}$.

While you are on a call, press $\nearrow > My$ Tel. Numbers.

Note: Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 47. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.




Taking and Sending a Photo

To activate your phone's camera:

The active viewfinder image appears on your display.

A Multimedia Messaging Service (MMS) message contains one or more slides with text and embedded media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice records, and/or video clips). You can send the multimedia message to other wireless phone users, and to email

Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone displays the ♥ (message waiting) indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.

Press	То
READ (🕒)	open the message

Multimedia messages that you receive can contain different media objects:

 Photos, pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message. A sound file or video clip begins playing when its slide is displayed. Use the volume keys to adjust the volume as the sound file or video clip plays.

Note: In a multimedia letter, you may have to highlight an indicator in the text to play a sound file or video clip.

Attached files are added to the end of the message.
 To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/filename and press VIEW (
) (image file type), PLAY (
) (sound file or video clip), or OPEN (
) (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).

Playing Video Clips


You can download video clips with the micro-browser, and send and receive video clips in multimedia messages.

To play a video clip stored on your phone:

Find the Feature > Multimedia > Videos




Learning to Use Your Phone

Using the Display

The *home screen* displays when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the 5-way navigation key (③) left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press ⑤ to return to the home screen.

Note: Your home screen may look different from the display shown above. For example, your service provider may hide the menu feature icons to allow a better view of


the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view. To show or hide the menu icons, see page 73.

The \blacksquare (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (\bigcirc) to enter the main menu.

Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left soft key (\bigcirc) or right soft key (\bigcirc) to perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.

Your phone can display an analog or digital clock in the home screen (see page 73).

The following status indicators can display:



1. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the i^a (no signal) indicator or $i^a \mathbf{x}$ (no transmit) indicator displays.



2. GPRS Indicator




Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) network connection. GPRS allows faster data transfer speeds. Indicators can include:

3. Data Transmission Indicator

7. Message Indicator

8. Location Indicator



Your phone may be able to send location information to the network during an emergency call. Indicators show when your phone is sending location information:

10. Battery Level Indicator

Vertical bars show the battery charge level. Recharge the battery when **Low Battery** displays and the battery alert sounds.

Using the 5-Way Navigation Key



Use the 5-way navigation key ((()) to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system, highlight menu items, change feature settings, and play games. Press the center select button to select a highlighted menu item. The center select button usually performs the same function as the right soft key ((())).

Using Menus

From the home screen, press to enter the main menu.



Press (a) to scroll to and highlight a menu feature icon in the main menu. The following icons represent features that may display in the main menu, depending on your service provider and service subscription options.

Selecting a Menu Feature


Find the Feature



This example shows that from the home screen, you must press , scroll to and select Recent Calls from the main menu, then scroll to and select Dialed Calls. Press (3) to scroll, and the left/right soft keys to select the functions displayed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



Press (a) to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.

In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.


In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

When an option has a list of possible values, press left or right to scroll through and select a value.


When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text

Some features require you to enter information.



The message center lets you compose and send text messages. A *Character Counter* indicates how many more characters will fit in the message.





Multiple text entry methods make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The method you select remains active until you select another method.

Press in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry methods:

Primary The primary text entry method

(see below to set).

Numeric Enter numbers only (see page

38).

Symbol Enter symbols only (see page 38).

Secondary The secondary text entry method

(see below to set).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry method in any text entry screen by pressing \nearrow > Entry Mode.

Setting Up a Text Entry Method

Press \nearrow > Entry Setup from any text entry screen. Select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup, and choose:

ITAP Let the phone predict each word

as you press keys (see page 36).

Tap Enter letters and numbers by

pressing a key one or more times.

Tap Extended Enter letters, numbers, and

more times.

None Hide the Secondary setting (only

available for Secondary Setup).

Using Capitalization

Press on in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalization status:

Using Tap Method

This is the standard method for entering text on your phone.

Tap method cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. Tap Extended method also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 35.

When you enter text with **Tap** or **Tap Extended** method, the soft key functions change.

Character displays at insertion point.




After 2 seconds, character is accepted and cursor moves to next position.

Press **DELETE** ((-)) to delete character to left of insertion point.

Press **OK** ((•)) to accept and store text.

When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter prog you might see:

Tap Method Text Entry Rules


- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press () left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.
- The first character of every sentence is capitalized. If necessary, press () down to force the character to lowercase before the cursor moves to the next position.
- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press 19 to exit without saving.

Using iTAP™ Method

iTAP[™] software provides a predictive text entry method that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **Tap** method, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.



For example, if you press (c), letter combinations that match your keypresses display:





If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press (**) to switch entry methods. An indicator shows which method is active (see page 33). If **ITAP** method is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry method, see page 32.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognize, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognized words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

Using Numeric Method

In a text entry screen, press of to switch entry methods until the 123 (numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press to switch to another entry method.

Using Symbol Method

In a text entry screen, press o to switch entry methods until the @ (symbol) indicator displays.

Deleting Letters and Words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

Action

Press **DELETE** (<) to delete one letter at a time.

Hold **DELETE** $(\overline{ })$ to delete the entire message.

Using the Smart Key

The smart key gives you another way to perform many basic phone functions. It anticipates the next action you are likely to perform. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it. You can use the smart key to make and end calls, turn features on and off, and open your phonebook. The smart key usually performs the same function as the right soft key ((-)).

Using the External Display

When the flip is closed, the external display shows time and phone status information. It also displays messages to notify you of incoming calls and other events. See page 22 for descriptions of the status indicators that may appear in the external display.

Note: You cannot make or receive calls when the phone is closed unless you attach a headset.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

When you activate your phone's built-in handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press **SPEAKER** (\bigcirc) to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press **SPEAKER** (\bigcirc) again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000.

Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, and/or call barring password if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Find the Feature

> **Se**

> Settings > Security

> New Passwords

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, but you must unlock it to answer.

You can make emergency calls on your phone even when it is locked (see page 55).

Locking Your Phone Manually

Unlocking Your Phone

Your phone's unlock code is originally set to 1234. Your service provider may reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number.

At the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:

Setting Your Phone to Lock Automatically

If You Forget a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset the unlock code to the last 4 digits of your phone number before you receive your phone.



If you forget your unlock code, try entering 1234 or the last 4 digits of your phone number. If that does not work, at the **Enter Unlock Code** prompt:

If you forget your security code, SIM card PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

Using the Phonebook

This section briefly describes basic phonebook operations. For more information about using the phonebook, see page 69.

Storing a Phone Number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press **STORE** ((-)) to create a phonebook entry with that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

Select **MORE** to store another number (for example, a work number) under the same Name.

Recording a Voice Name

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press **RECORD** (\bigcirc). Press and release the voice key and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted, press and release the voice key and repeat the name. Press **DONE** (\bigcirc) to store the voice name.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

Storing a Picture for Caller ID

You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture appears when you receive calls from the entry.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press **CHANGE** (\bigcirc). Press \bigcirc to select a picture, and press **SELECT** (\bigcirc) to store it for the entry.

Tip: To quickly highlight entries in your **Phonebook** list: If your entries are sorted by Speed No., press an entry's speed number to highlight it. For example, press (sm) for entry number 15. Specific Absorption Rate Data

The model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.2 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as

described in this user guide, is 0.38 W/kg. The SAR value for this product in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.32 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).²

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.

The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user's guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.

Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorized antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch (2.5 centimeters) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch (2.5 centimeters) from your body.

Approved Accessories

RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimeters) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches (15 centimeters) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- · NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.

When using your phone while driving, please:

- · Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- Use handsfree operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewelry, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.

To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a flashing-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15-minute break hourly.
- · Play in a room in which all lights are on.

Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you play games on your phone, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

Following are safety-related questions and answers discussed at this web site.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio

frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety guestions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products--and at this point we do not know that there is--it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna

Again, the scientific data <u>do not</u> demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly

precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) *charged two companies* that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

- 7 Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention away from the road.

- 8 Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies.*
- 9 Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.*
- 10 Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.*
